Bob Fairchild inducted to Coaches Hall of Fame

JEFFERSON CITY — While President Bush, politics and the Show-Me Games were getting the attention in Columbia Friday, high school football coaches were the topic of conversation 30 miles down the road in Jefferson City Saturday.

Chillicothe's football coaching legend Bob Fairchild was among 21 high school football coaches that were inducted into the Missouri High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame. Nearly 300 attended the special luncheon at the Ramada Inn in Jefferson City.

"It's a great honor. I've been fortunate to be surrounded by great assistant coaches, dedicated athletes, a progressive school system and a supportive community over the years. It takes everyone working together to build a winning tradition," said Fairchild.

Attending from Chillicothe were Fairchild's wife, Karen; his two sons, David and Perry; and Hornet assistant coach Phil Willard and wife, Debra.

Fairchild: A Winner

An incredible 32-year career record of 258-59-5, five state football championships, two state semifinal appearances add up to Hall of Fame credentials.

In 29 years at Chillicothe, Fairchild's charges have compiled a 238-55-3 record. He was named the 1991 state 3A Coach of the Year after his Hornets steamrolled over Herculaneum, 40-12, in the state 3A championship game in Springfield.

Fairchild has also been named 4A Coach of the Year and Kodak Coach of the Year.

Fairchild is a graduate of Chillicothe High School and Northwest Missouri State University-Maryville.

Other Inductees

Other familiar names to Hornet football fans being inducted Saturday were Cecil Naylor of Marshall, Hugh Dunn of Macon, Bob Fisher of Fulton and Cliff Cromer of Higginsville. Cromer also coached at Brookfield and Carrollton.

Other inductees included Pete Adkins, Jefferson City; Paul Martel, St. Louis University High; Joe

Mintner, Park Hill; Ted Chittwood, Raytown; Charles McCallister, Aurora; Harold Flanagan, St. Francis Borgia; Bill Hamann, Lexington; Bob Johnson, McCluer; Calvin Lane, Neosho; Paul Mullins, Springfield Greenwood; Cecil Patterson, K.C. Southeast; Jim Pearson, Springfield Kickapoo; William Robinson, K.C. Southwest; Jim Scanlan, Washington; Art Seals, South Shelby; and Ed Velten, Ladue.

Adkins, a 42-year coaching veteran, was the most celebrated inductee. At Jefferson City Public High, Adkins has compiled a phenomenal 367-59-4 record which includes six state championships, 15 playoff appearances, 15 conference championships and a 71-game winning streak.

Martel is the dean of the inductees with 45 years of service in the coaching field.

Patterson was inducted posthumously. The other 20 inductees were in attendance.

Phenomenal Credentials

The blue-chip inaugural class dedicated over 1,000 years to the high school coaching profession, according to Doug Potts, football coach at Bolivar High School and

president of the Missouri Coaches Association. "They have combined for over 4,000 wins, 200 conference or league championships, 125 playoff appearances and 19 state championships. The overall winning percentage for the 21 inductees is 75 percent," said Potts.

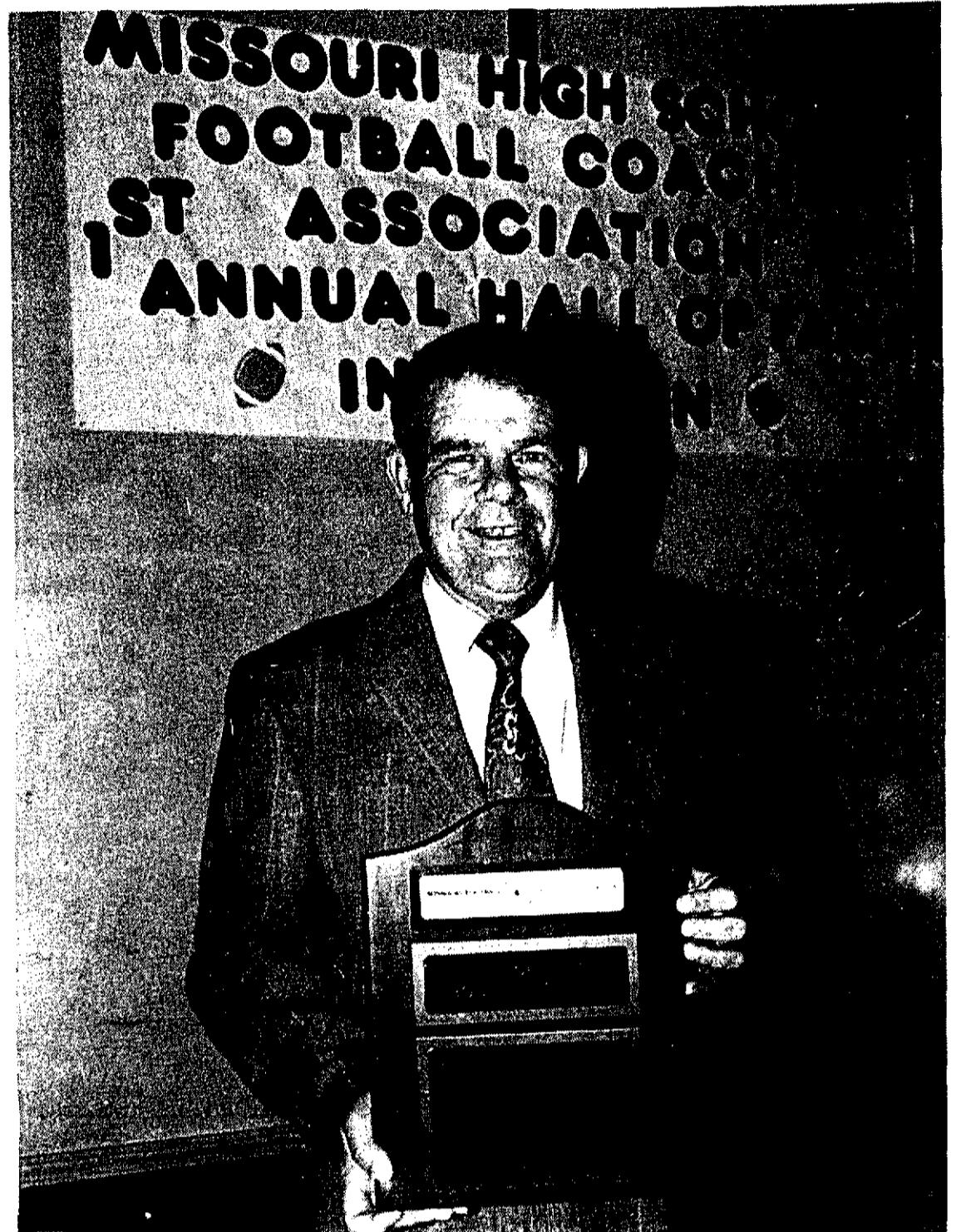
"Seven of the 21 coaches have

won more than 220 games. That is an enviable accomplishment. Four of the seven are retired while the other three are going strong," Potts added.

Cecil Naylor, a graduate of Missouri Valley-Marshall, has compiled a 221-82-14 record in 32 years at Marshall High School. His teams have won 11 conference

championships and made eight playoff appearances. They won the title in 1986.

Hugh Dunn, a graduate of Missouri Valley-Marshall, was in the coaching business for 40 years. His teams compiled a 213-148-13 record. He won six league championships and made four playoff appearances.

AUTO RACING

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) — Ernie Ivan came back from a lap down and stormed to victory Sunday in the 500-mile race. Ivan set a race record of 176.306 mph, fourth fastest in NASCAR history, ahead of Sterling Marlin. Ivan has won three of the last six Winston Cup events.

Davey Allison, retired a week ago in a crash at Pocono International Raceway, and hospitalized most of the week, started in his Ford Thunderbird, and gave way to Bobby Allen Jr. during a caution lap. Hill finished third and helped Allison regain his series points lead by one over 10th-place finisher Bill Elliott.

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) — Ernie Ivan passed Dale Earnhardt three turns from the end and held on Saturday to win the 500-mile race. Ivan's eighth Grand National stock car race at Talladega Super Speedway and the fastest in series history.

Michael Waltrip finished second a half-car length behind. Todd Bodine was third, followed by Earnhardt and Hut Stricklin.

Ivan, earning his third career Grand National victory, averaged 158.359 mph, breaking the record of 157.137 set by Geoff Bodine in Feb. 1985.

HOCKENHEIM, Germany (AP) — Nigel Mansell led all but five of 45 laps Sunday to win the German Grand Prix, his eighth Formula One in 10 races this year. Mansell won at 145.897 mph in 1 hour, 18 minutes and 22 seconds, 4 1/2 seconds ahead of defending series champion Michael Schumacher of Brazil. Mansell remained in first place for the season championship with 85 points to 49 for second-place Riccardo Patrese of Italy.

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — P.J. Jones won his first-ever IMSA Camel GT race, the G.I. Joe's Camel Gran Prix at Portland International Raceway Sunday.

Michael Menzies, 1-11, 7:25 p.m. ahead of teammate and series points leader Juan Manuel Fangio II and earned \$30,000. Chip Robinson finished third.
